The recently passed federal stimulus package authorizes specific agencies -- such as the National Institutes of Health, the National Science Foundation, the Department of Energy, NASA and others -- to spend billions of dollars quickly on new funding for research. KU is well positioned to take advantage of these increases in research funding.

Debra Kamps Receives KU's Research Achievement Award

Debra Kamps, director of the Kansas Center for Autism Research and Training and associate director and senior scientist at the Juniper Gardens Children's Project, is the 2009 recipient of the University of Kansas Research Achievement Award.

The award is given annually to a full-time KU academic staff researcher working within an academic department or research center. Kamps was recognized at last month's Research and Graduate Studies convocation with a plaque presented by Richard Lariviere, executive vice chancellor and provost. The award includes \$10,000 in research funds.

In his nomination letter, Charles Greenwood, director of Juniper Gardens, wrote, "Dr. Kamps truly exemplifies KU's expectations of a scholar's contribution to research, service and teaching. She continues to have a significant impact on her field through her productive record of research."

Proposal Preparation Fund Introduced

Researchers who are 100% grant-funded are generally prohibited from spending time on the preparation of new or competitive-renewal grant proposals. To assist researchers in this situation, the Office of Research and Graduate Studies has introduced the Proposal Preparation Fund (PPF). Successful applicants can receive up to 5% of the preparer's annual compensation as a supplement to support the development and submission of a specific grant proposal.

Research Summit to Honor Outstanding Graduate Students March 12

The 6th annual Graduate Student Research Summit is scheduled for Topeka on Thursday, March 12 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. With the State Capitol undergoing renovation, this year's event will be held in the auditorium of the Docking State Office Building, located at 915 Southwest Harrison, directly west of the Capitol. The event is free and open to the public. Faculty and graduate students are encouraged to attend.

The summit features poster presentations by outstanding graduate students from KU, Kansas State, and Wichita State. KU will be represented by eight students from the Lawrence campus and five from the Medical Center. KansasBIO, the state's trade and advocacy association for the biosciences industry, will present \$3,000 in awards to students with exceptional work. Lawrence campus participants were chosen in conjunction with the annual KU Graduate Student Research Competition, held February 23 in the Kansas Union. That event was sponsored by the KU Graduate and Professional Association and the Office of Research and Graduate Studies. It featured a record 44 papers and 72 poster presentations in three separate categories: Humanities and Fine Arts, Natural Sciences (including pharmacy and engineering) and Social Sciences. A total of \$3,500 will be awarded in conjunction with the April 29 Graduate Studies Awards Ceremony.

Jeff Aubé Receives State Award

Jeff Aubé, professor of medicinal chemistry at KU, was recognized January 27 in Topeka as the 2009 recipient of the KansasBIO Bioscience Industry Growth Award in the academic research and development category.

In his letter of nomination, Steve Warren, vice provost for research and graduate studies, wrote "Our outstanding faculty and facilities continue to give KU an edge in the highly competitive grant funding process, and that ultimately pays off for the biosciences industry

in our state. The work being done by Jeff and his talented teams of researchers is giving KU a high degree of national recognition, adding to our reputation and enhancing our ability to recruit and retain faculty, attract top graduate students, collaborate with industry, and compete for additional research grants.”

The award presentation took place during a reception concluding the annual “Bioscience Day at the Capitol.”

Recognition for KU Medicinal Chemistry

A special session at this year’s 9th Winter Conference on Bioorganic Medicinal Chemistry conference featured the KU Department of Medicinal Chemistry. The meeting, held January 25-29 in Steamboat Springs, CO, was attended by more than 200 scientists from academia, industry, and government. It featured five speakers from the Medicinal Chemistry: Professors Jane Aldrich, Brian Blagg, Blake Peterson, Thomas Prisinzano, and Emily Scott.

This marked only the third time the conference has held a full session honoring a single department. It was first time a department of medicinal chemistry was chosen.

The department was well represented at the meeting, with more than 15 graduate student and postdoctoral fellows attending and presenting either short talks or poster presentations.

Note: the winter conference traditionally features a hockey game, pitting academic scientists against industrial scientists. Three members of the KU delegation participated, but ESPN did not report the final score.

Susan Eisenhower to Lead Discussion on Nation’s Energy Future

Susan Eisenhower, a prominent energy policy strategist and respected international affairs expert, is coming to the University of Kansas on Thurs., March 5 as part of her two-month, six-city tour focusing on the nation’s energy future.

While in Lawrence, she will tour campus facilities and meet with KU students and energy researchers. Her visit will conclude at the Dole Institute of Politics with a 1:30 – 3:30 p.m. presentation and town hall discussion with Kansas business and political leaders.

The KU Energy Council is hosting Eisenhower’s visit, the only stop on her tour taking place at a university. Other locations are Chicago, Philadelphia, Oklahoma City, Albuquerque and Charleston, West Virginia.

“Energy production is a major industry in Kansas,” said Laurence Weatherley, chair of the council and chair of KU’s Department of Chemical and Petroleum Engineering. “So having someone of her stature on campus to learn more about our research is a terrific opportunity to showcase what’s happening here and elsewhere in the state.”

Eisenhower, a granddaughter of the 34th president, is using the tour to share her concern for the necessity of a national “green grid,” capable of transmitting diverse energy resources efficiently and effectively. “I hope to gain as many local perspectives as possible,” said Eisenhower. “Secure power transmission is critical to the safety and sustainability of our economy.”

After her tour, Eisenhower plans to report her findings in Washington, D.C. before an audience of energy experts and federal officials. She will also prepare a white paper that she hopes will provide a blueprint for national policy choices on electrical transmission issues. Webinar on Export Controls Planned March 26

The Office of Research Integrity is hosting a free webinar on Thurs., March 26 from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. at 152 Smissman Laboratories. “The Essentials of Export Controls” is provided by NCURA, the National Council of University Research Administrators.

“Exports” can include both the shipment of materials to another country and/or the disclosure of controlled information to foreign nationals who are in the U.S. Researchers, administrative staff, or other members of the university community who in the course of their university activities ship materials, equipment or technology across U.S. borders, or who may share controlled technology, equipment or materials with foreign nationals through their university activities, are encouraged to attend this overview.

The webinar will provide a concise overview of these complex regulations: Export Administration Regulations, International Traffic in Arms Regulations, and the Office of Foreign Asset Control. Topics to be covered include the differences between EAR and ITAR;

key export control issues and how these issues affect universities; how to determine the need for a license; sanctions for noncompliance; and export control management plans.

The research audit process can be intimidating to the uninitiated, especially when an auditor shows up unexpectedly. How should you respond? Do you have to respond? These and many other questions will be addressed during a free video panel discussion on March 26 from 1-5 p.m. in the Simons Auditorium at the Higuchi Biosciences Center.

“Audits and the Audit Process” was organized by the National Council of University Research Administrators (NCURA) and the viewing is presented by the Office of Research Integrity. The program will discuss the audit process and the differences between audits, reviews, inspections and investigations. It will also look at how auditors approach an audit, and the various roles of the institutional audit and compliance officer, the central research administrator, and the departmental research administrator.

Awardees receive \$400, applicable toward transportation, housing, conference fees and other allowable expenses. Awards are made on a first-come, first-served basis until all budgeted funds are expended.

KU Hosts Big 12 Research Administrators Conference

More than 100 research administrators from universities throughout the Midwest will be in Lawrence March 3-5 for the annual Big 12 Sponsored Programs Conference. It’s a professional development opportunity, as well as an introduction to the University of Kansas for the campus staff who help researchers obtain and manage grants.

“Hosting the meeting gives us a chance to showcase KU and Lawrence,” said Susan Sloop, associate director of the Higuchi Biosciences Center and a co-host of the conference. “It rotates each year. The last time KU organized the conference it was in Kansas City. Holding it in downtown Lawrence is a real attraction for our guests and gives them a better idea of who we are as a university.”

The business portion of the conference will take place at SpringHill Suites in Lawrence. Participants will attend working sessions on a variety of topics related to the pre-award and post-award process. The event is open to administrators from all universities, not just those in the Big 12.

“The annual conference is a time to discuss problems, share information and form networks with peers,” said co-host Kristi Billinger, assistant manager of proposal services in the Office of Research and Graduate Studies. “We are competitive when it comes to seeking grants but very collaborative when it comes to helping each other do a better job as research administrators.”

The meeting will include an overview of federal research issues by David Kennedy, an official with the Washington-based Council on Governmental Relations. Also featured is a web presentation by Michael Pellegrino of Grants.gov, a recently created federal program that simplifies and streamlines the process of finding and applying for grants.

Participants will get a bus tour of Lawrence and KU the first day of the conference, followed by a reception at the Multidisciplinary Research Building on the West Campus. The following evening, the Lawrence Community Theatre will present a “Mystery Dinner” performance for the group at Macelli’s.

NSF Updates Guide to Reflect Mentoring Requirement

The National Science Foundation (NSF) has updated the Grant Proposal Guide, effective April 6, 2009. Proposals submitted to NSF on or after this date must include a maximum one-page description of mentoring activities if the proposal includes post-doctoral researchers. This required information should be included as a supplementary document. Currently, mentoring activities are described within the 15-page "project description." This mentoring plan will be evaluated during the merit review process, under the Broader Impacts criterion. Proposals that do not include the mentoring plan in the appropriate section will be returned without review.

The change was mandated as part of the America Competes Act and is contained in the revised *NSF Proposal & Award Policies & Procedures Guide, NSF 09-29*. **Link:** www.nsf.gov/publications/pub_summ.jsp?ods_key=nsf0929.

NIH Electronic Mailing Lists

In December 2007, NIH established two electronic mailing lists (listservs) to provide periodic updates on the electronic submission of grant applications and the eRA Commons: one for scientists/PIs, and one for research administrators. While research administrators in Proposal Services at RGS subscribe to the research administration listserv and endeavor to share information with the research community at large whenever possible, we strongly encourage PIs and center and departmental administrators to subscribe as well. These listservs provide a direct source for updates and strategies for interacting electronically with NIH. The electronic mailings alert the research community to:

- Critical situations that may arise, particularly around high-volume receipt dates
- Changes to electronic submission deadlines due to system failures (e.g., extension of application correction or viewing windows)
- New features and functionality
- Scheduled service interruptions
- Known issues and workarounds
- Other items of interest

Patricia Summers, vice president for marketing of CollegeNet, visited KU recently to discuss the university's 10-year partnership with her company. CollegeNet is KU's online application admission vendor.

Summers met with staff from the Office of Admissions and Scholarships, the Office of International Student and Scholar Services-Undergraduate Admissions, the Graduate Application Processing Center, the School of Social Welfare MSW program, and the School of Education Teacher Education program. "We really value the partnership we have built with KU," said Summers. "We support your efforts to recruit domestic and international undergraduate and graduate students to KU."

The visit and meetings were scheduled by KU's Graduate Studies Office. Sara Rosen, associate vice provost and dean of graduate studies, said, "There is a dynamic energy that takes place when we can talk with the vendor, use real time examples to address our needs and find solutions for our graduate programs. We have benefited greatly from the CollegeNet partnership and we will look forward to adding to our existing efforts in the near future."

Nominations Sought for Dissertation Awards

The Graduate Studies Office is calling for nominations for two separate dissertation prizes:

The Dorothy Haglund Prize for an outstanding doctoral dissertation was made possible by former Vice Chancellor William J. Argersinger, his wife, and their friends, with the cooperation of KU Endowment. The award recognizes Ms. Haglund, long-time Graduate School staff member who served as director of graduate admissions and records and later as assistant dean of the college. Since 1979, the award has been presented at the Doctoral Hooding Ceremony.

The Argersinger Prize for an outstanding doctoral dissertation was made possible through the further generosity of William and Marnie Argersinger, with the cooperation of KU Endowment.

Nominations for both prizes will be accepted until 5 p.m. Friday, April 3, 2009 from academic departments with doctoral programs under their jurisdiction. Each department with a doctoral program may submit only one nomination for a dissertation prize. A nomination consists of a copy of the nominee's dissertation and a nomination letter that briefly describes the dissertation's quality, originality and significance. The letter should clarify to a person outside the discipline why the dissertation is considered outstanding.

Candidates who defend their dissertations by March 31, 2009, and completed requirements for the degree for graduation in May, August or December 2008 or May 2009, are eligible for dissertation prizes this year. As specified by the donors, the nominees must have passed the dissertation defense with honors.

Nominations Sought for Graduate Educator Award

The Graduate Studies Office is calling for nominations for the **Louise Byrd Graduate Educator Award**.

The award was established in 1984 to honor the memory of Louise Byrd, long-time secretary of the Graduate School and the Graduate Council. She was noted for her deep concern for the welfare of graduate students in the pursuit of their academic goals. Each year, in her memory, a faculty member who demonstrates the qualities of concern for graduate students as scholars and individuals has been honored at the Doctoral Hooding Ceremony. The names of recipients are affixed to a plaque in the Kansas Memorial Union and the Graduate Studies Office provides a monetary prize.

All regular members of the Graduate Faculty are eligible to receive this recognition. Graduate students, past or present, and KU Graduate Faculty at all campuses are invited to submit nominations, consisting of a letter of nomination, a copy of the nominee's curriculum vita, and letters of support from graduate students, faculty, alumni and others. All materials should be sent to Rochelle Montgomery, Graduate Studies Office, 213 Strong Hall, Lawrence Campus, no later than 5 p.m. Friday, April 3, 2009. A committee will review nominations and, if necessary, request further information. The committee will then make a recommendation to Dean Sara Rosen.

KU Licenses Advanced Financial Search Technology to neo Abacus, Inc.

On-line technologies designed to quickly access and analyze highly complex information, have been licensed by the University of Kansas to a private company: neo Abacus, Inc.

Rajendra Srivastava, KU's Ernst & Young Distinguished Professor of Business and director of the Ernst & Young Center for Auditing Research and Advanced Technology, is the inventor of FRAANK (Financial Reporting and Auditing Agent with Net Knowledge) and SEEK-INF (Search Engine to Extract Knowledge from Industrial Filings). Within seconds, the technologies search for and compile financial and non-financial data from public documents, aiding in the preparation of risk assessment models by investors, traders, financial analysts and researchers.

FRAANK is an on-line technology that retrieves information filed with the federal Securities and Exchange Commission, such as Form 10-K and Form 10-Q. This information is then tagged for analysis, using XBRL (Extensible Business Reporting Language) technology.

"Just as HTML revolutionized the web," said Srivastava, "XBRL revolutionizes the accessing, processing and reporting of business information. Regardless of computer platform or application, it makes the using and sharing of information seamless and more transparent for the user."

neo Abacus, an innovator in business intelligence, has signed a license agreement with KU as part of the company's next-generation information supply chain (ISC) platform. FRAANK On-Line will be available as a web subscription service.

"I was impressed with KU's technology when I first encountered it," said Donald Meek, chairman and CEO of neo Abacus. "After additional discussion with Prof. Srivastava, and multiple visits to Lawrence, I was equally impressed with the intellectual talent and resources available at the university. We are hopeful this licensing agreement marks the beginning of a growing research collaboration with KU."

One example of that collaboration is the company's co-sponsorship of KU's fourth annual International Conference on XBRL, scheduled for April 24-25 in Lawrence. Global industry and academic experts will present on the opportunities and challenges associated with using this technology.

“Year of Innovation” Activities Kick Off in March

The Kansas City Area Development Council has proclaimed 2009 the Year of Innovation in the Greater Kansas City region. The program is “spotlighting the legacy and future of innovation . . . celebrating creative thinkers and their integral contribution to Kansas City, the nation and the world.”

KU is participating in the Year of Innovation celebration, along with the Kauffman Foundation, Hallmark, the KTEC Pipeline, the University of Missouri-Kansas City, and a number of other organizations on both sides of the state line.

Year of Innovation will kick off March 5 with an industry-university roundtable presentation and news conference. Among the roundtable participants will be Sitta Sittampalam, deputy director of the Office of Therapeutics and Drug Development at the KU Cancer Center.

Duties: Primarily, I assist PIs, faculty and other researchers with the submission of sponsored research proposals to federal and state agencies, foundations, and corporations. Proposal Services strives to help with every aspect of the pre-award process: constructing budgets, reading the submission guidelines (and making sure they are followed in the proposal), checking for compliance issues (important, since many PIs are unaware they have any), gathering pieces of the proposal from collaborating institutions and other investigators at KU, uploading pieces of the proposal into online submission sites, helping with formatting problems, and tracking proposals after submission. Quite often, we provide information to the program officers at agencies after submission and aid individuals at collaborating institutions. (I’ve been surprised to learn how little support some institutions provide their research faculty in submitting proposals.) Also, we provide moral support and counseling for PIs as needed!
